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1.4 Responsibility for Stumpage

For the purposes of Section 105 of the *Forest Act*, the following employees of the ministry are authorized to determine, redetermine and vary stumpage rates:

- Regional Managers, Regional Appraisal Coordinators or Officers, or other employees authorized by the Regional Manager, and
- Director, Revenue Branch and employees of Revenue Branch.

1.5 Market Pricing System

Market Pricing System (MPS), subject to a minimum stumpage rate, is the basis for determining stumpage rates for timber sale licences awarded under Sections 20 and 21 of the *Forest Act* on or after January 1, 1999.

1.6 Comparative Value Timber Pricing

Comparative Value Pricing (CVP), subject to a minimum stumpage rate, is the basis for determining stumpage rates for all cutting authorities except those specified under Section 1.5. Section 2.1, (2.), (3.) and (4.) provides the methods that are used for specific products and extra ordinary situations.

A method for determining the average stumpage rate for the Coast has been set by the provincial government. The stumpage rate for a cutting authority area is more or less than the Base Rate (see Section 5.5) depending on whether or not the timber in the cutting authority area is more or less valuable than timber from the average cutting authority area. To make that assessment and hence to determine a stumpage rate, the Appraisal Coordinator will typically:

1. Estimate the Average Selling Price of the logs for the cutting authority area (see Chapter 3).
2. Estimate the least Operating Cost (see Chapter 4) for the cutting authority area.
3. Determine the Value Index (see Chapter 5) for the cutting authority area by subtracting the estimated least Operating Cost from the estimated Average Selling Price.
4. Determine the indicated stumpage rate by comparing the Value Index for the cutting authority area with the Coast Mean Value Index and adding the Coast Base Rate (see Chapter 5).
5. Determine the reserve stumpage rate (see Chapter 5) by selecting:
 - a. the greater of the indicated stumpage rate or the prescribed minimum stumpage rate, or
 - b. for an appraised cutting authority area containing timber licence volume, the greater of the adjusted indicated stumpage rate or the prescribed minimum stumpage rate.
6. Determine the upset stumpage rate by adding any development or silviculture levies (see Section 6.5) to the reserve stumpage rate,
7. Determine the total stumpage rate by adding any bonus bid to the upset stumpage rate.

One stumpage rate is determined for all appraised timber in each cutting authority area with the exception of miscellaneous stumpage rates under Section 6.6.

The average stumpage rate or Target Rate for the coast is calculated as a function of a coast softwood lumber price index (see Chapter 5).

The Coast Target Rate is adjusted to the Coast Base Rate as described in the publication *Specifications: Calculating Stumpage Rates for Coast Appraisals*.

1.7 Stumpage Adjustments

Unless a cutting authority or the application and tender for a timber sale licence specifies that stumpage rates are fixed for a specified period or for the full term of the cutting authority, stumpage rates are adjusted quarterly on January 1, April 1, July 1, and October 1 of each year, subject to Section 6.4.

Commencing each quarter, the stumpage rates are adjusted to reflect changes in estimated Average Selling Prices based on revised average market values (as authorized in this manual since the previous adjustment) and the recalculated Operating Cost based on the appropriate trend factors in Section 4.9. In addition, the adjustment reflects changes in the Statistics Canada Coast Softwood Lumber Index, the Statistics Canada Pulpwood Chip Index for British Columbia, the Coast Base Rate and the Coast Mean Value Index (see Section 5).

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Appraisal Principles and Procedures

2

2.1 Types of Determination

Stumpage rates are determined by one of the following methods:

1. An appraisal or reappraisal under Chapters 3 and 4 of this manual.
2. An Order-in-Council directive setting stumpage rates under the *Forest Act*, Section 105.
3. Pricing under Chapter 6 of this manual.
4. The use of stumpage rates developed by regional revenue staff, and approved by the Regional Manager or Regional Manager's designate.
5. An appraisal under Chapter 7 for timber sale licences awarded under Sections 20 or 21 of the *Forest Act* on or after January 1, 1999.

Phase cost estimates for specified operations, helicopter logging operations and conventional logging are weighted according to the applicable net cruise volume under the cutting authority for each system.

4.1.1 Specified Operations

In addition to the logging phases and systems that are covered by this manual, there are specified operations which require special cost estimates.

The following is a complete list of specified operations for which certain cost phase estimates are based on the information on hand rather than on the tables and formulas in this manual. Specified operation cost estimates are combined with associated *Coast Appraisal Manual* phase cost estimates to determine the least total operating cost for the cutting authority being appraised.

The specified operations phase costs are monitored and updated by the regional manager and may not be part of the annual cost collection and analysis process.

4.2 Appraisal Data Requirements

The cruise and all other pertinent information required for the appraisal must be submitted with the appropriate *COAST APPRAISAL DATA SHEET*.

Unless otherwise specified by the Director, Revenue Branch, cruise data must be gathered and compiled according to the approved utilization specifications and in accordance with the following Ministry of Forests Publications:

- Ministry of Forests Provincial Cruising Manual,
- Cruise Compilation Design Manual,
- Forest Service Policies (e.g., Timber Utilization Policy & Procedures for the Coast of the Province), and
- Regional Publications (e.g., Operational Cruising Requirements in the Vancouver and Prince Rupert Forest Regions).

In order to verify the accuracy of the cruise compilation program, the licensee must provide on request, photocopies of the tally sheets and a magnetic copy of the compilation in a format prescribed by the regional manager.

The appraisal uses the net cruise volume of timber. The net cruise volume (m^3) is the gross volume (m^3) less decay, waste and breakage for all the species listed in Section 3.3. The cutting authority total net cruise volume is determined by multiplying the net cruise volume per hectare (m^3/ha) by the total merchantable timbered area (ha) to be harvested under the cutting authority. The total merchantable timbered area is determined from the cruise summary if available.

If the application for a cutting authority is subsequently modified, the cruise submission must be recompiled by the applicant when more than five percent of the total number of compiled plots used in the cruise submission lie outside the boundaries established for the initial appraisal of the cutting authority.

Each reappraisal uses the net cruise volume by species determined by adjusting the original cruise volume on the basis of approved amendments since the last appraisal.

Plots located in areas requiring helicopter logging or specified operations are included in the cruise compilation calculation of conventional logging.

5.2 Value Index

The stumpage rate charged on each cutting authority area is keyed to the estimated Value Index of the stand to be harvested. The Value Index is defined as the Selling Price less the Operating Cost, both of which are estimates expected for an average operator in that stand. The formula to be used is:

$$VI = SP - OC$$

Where:

- VI = Value Index for the cutting authority.
- SP = estimated stand Selling Price determined in accordance with Chapter 3.
- OC = estimated Operating Cost applicable to the timber being appraised, and determined in accordance with Chapter 4.

5.3 Mean Value Index

The Coast Mean Value Index (MVI) is the benchmark against which individual stands of timber are compared. The Mean Value Index is recalculated and published by Revenue Branch at the time of each quarterly stumpage adjustment. When distributed it becomes an integral part of this manual.

Prior to January 1, 1999, the MVI does not include any timber licence marks. However, effective with the January 1, 1999 stumpage adjustment, appraised timber licence cutting permits are included in the MVI.

6.2 Cutting Authorities With 5 000 m³ or Less Volume

1. Total Volume of less than 2 000 m³
 - a. Average Value Indexes by District and Species (DVI)

An indicated stumpage rate may be determined by estimating the species volumes, prorating the appropriate Average Value Indexes by District and Species according to those volumes, and then using the resulting stand value index in the stumpage rate formula as described under Section 5.6. For cutting authorities where the licensee is not required to establish a free growing crop of trees, the Value Indexes must be adjusted by adding a basic silviculture cost estimate (District Average Value Indexes are based on full appraisals of areas requiring basic silviculture). The total stumpage rate is fixed for the term of the cutting authority (for extensions see Section 2.4.4).

The upset stumpage rate for cutting authorities with 500 m³ or less volume, awarded under the small scale salvage initiative, will be one-half the DVI calculated stumpage rate.

- b. Full Appraisal

Alternatively, an indicated stumpage rate may be determined through a full appraisal. The stand data may be site-specific or obtained from one or more comparable cutting authority areas (e.g., similar stand and terrain characteristics, etc.) and is recorded on a Coast Appraisal Data Sheet. The total stumpage rate is adjustable for the term of the cutting authority, except as provided in Section 6.4.

Each full appraisal is made as described in Chapters 3, 4 and 5.

2. Total Volume of 2 000 to 5 000 m³

An indicated stumpage rate is determined on the basis of full appraisal data. The data may be site-specific or the data may be obtained from comparable cutting authority areas, as determined by the Regional Manager.

Each appraisal is made as described in Chapters 3, 4 and 5.

These sales are cruised if specified by the Regional Manager in accordance with Section 4.2 of this manual.

The total stumpage rate is adjustable for the term of the cutting authority, except as provided in Section 6.4.

6.3 Partially Harvested Timber

In the case of decked timber, or timber which has been felled and bucked, such as on rights-of-way, and the volume exceeds 300 m³, a full cost estimate appraisal is completed on an "as is, where is" basis.

6.4 Small Business Forest Enterprise Program (SBFEP) Sales

For appraisal purposes, the SBFEP includes:

- all Timber Sale Licences issued under the *Forest Act*, Sections 20 and 21, and
- all TSLs issued under the *Forest Act*, Section 23 except 23(1)(a) and 23(1)(b).

Fixed/Adjustable Stumpage Rates for SBFEP Cutting Authorities

The adjustable rate option can be provided to a licensee only if the upset rate has been determined by means of a full appraisal. The data for the full appraisal may be site-specific or may be obtained from one or more comparable cutting authority areas. Once a selection has been made, it remains in effect for the term and all extensions. If the District Value Index method is used, the upset and hence the total stumpage rate is fixed for the term of the cutting authority and all extensions. The only exceptions are if a reappraisal is done under Section 2.3 (1), Sudden and Severe Damage or Section 2.3 (4) Minister's Direction.

A licensee's election of fixed stumpage rates precludes any correction to the upset stumpage rate determination that would otherwise be warranted because of an error in the appraisal.

For Section 20 and 21 timber sale licences (on and after January 1, 1999) refer to Chapter 7.

Section 20 Timber Sale Licences (Prior to May 1, 1994)

A licensee who holds a timber sale licence issued under Section 20 of the *Forest Act* that was advertised or awarded prior to May 1, 1994 may elect to have the stumpage rate on that licence fixed at the April 30, 1994 level for the term and all extensions. The election must have been made prior to July 1, 1994.

Section 21 Timber Sale Licences (Prior to May 1, 1994)

For a timber sale licence issued under Section 21 of the *Forest Act*, the licensee may have elected to have the stumpage rate fixed at the April 30, 1994 level until April 30, 1996 on timber marks issued under that licence if:

- the timber sale licence was advertised or awarded prior to May 1, 1994,
- the timber mark was issued prior to May 1, 1994, and
- the election to fix rates was made before July 1, 1994.

The above timber marks with rates fixed until April 30, 1996 will be reappraised effective May 1, 1996. All subsequent reappraisals for those timber marks will be as per Section 2.3.

6.5 Levies

The amount of any levy may be redetermined at reappraisals only.

1. Basic Silviculture Levy

A basic silviculture cost estimate is made for every cutting authority that will require basic silviculture, including those with a volume of less than 2 000 m³.

A basic silviculture levy may be added to the Reserve Stumpage Rate. The levy is \$0.00/m³ if no Crown expenditures are anticipated for basic silviculture, or the district manager may set the levy at \$0.00/m³ if the sale is offered under the *Forest Act*, Section 20, and the District Manager is satisfied that there will be competition for the sale. Otherwise the silviculture levy is equal to the appraisal estimate of basic silviculture costs provided by the Crown (trended at the time of the appraisal).

2. Development Levy

A development levy may be added to the Reserve Stumpage Rate. The levy is \$0.00/m³ if no Crown expenditures are anticipated for road construction and other services, or the District Manager may set the levy at \$0.00/m³ if the sale is offered under the *Forest Act*, Section 20, and the District Manager is satisfied that there will be competition for the sale. Otherwise, the development levy is equal to the appraisal cost estimate of road construction and other extraordinary services provided by the Crown as determined by the Regional Manager (trended at the time of the appraisal).

The amount of any levy may be re-determined at reappraisal only.

6.6 Miscellaneous Stumpage Rates

For the purpose of determining stumpage rates for certain special forest products, including deciduous species, low grade logs and timber in specified areas listed under this section, the miscellaneous stumpage rates tables are to be used.

6.6.1 Special Forest Products and Other Miscellaneous Rates

Table 6-1 is to be used for determining stumpage rates for the specified products when scaled.

Market Pricing System

The Market Pricing System (MPS) policy provided in this chapter is to be used only for fully appraised timber sale licences awarded under Section 20 and 21 of the *Forest Act* on or after January 1, 1999.

Chapters 3, 4, 5 and 6 of this manual are only to be used for Section 20 and 21 TSLs where directly referenced in Chapter 7.

7.1 Market Pricing System Introduction

The Market Pricing System (MPS) is the basis for determining sawlog stumpage rates for timber sale licences issued under Section 20 and 21 of the Forest Act, subject to a minimum stumpage rate. Sections 2.1 (2) and (3) of this manual provide the methods that are used for deriving stumpage rates for specific products and extraordinary situations.

MPS is a method of estimating the stumpage value of a cutting authority area based on the results of previous similar cutting authority areas that were sold competitively.

MPS can only be used where there is complete appraisal data available for the cutting authority area. Where data is not available, see Section 6.2.

The MPS upset rate and bonus bid applies to coniferous sawlogs only. All deciduous species, special forest products and Y grade logs have a default price listed under Section 6.6.

7.2 MPS Principles and Procedures

7.2.1 Calculation Conventions

Stumpage rate calculations are performed according to the methods specified in the document entitled, *Specifications: Calculating Stumpage Rates for Coast Appraisals for the Market Pricing System* approved by the Director, Revenue Branch.

7.2.2 Methodology

Calculating the upset stumpage rate for Small Business Forest Enterprise Program (SBFEP) timber sale licences, issued under Section 20 and 21 of the *Forest Act* after January 1, 1999, will be done using the following methodology:

1. Calculate a preliminary market stumpage price using the equation in Section 7.4.2 with the variables as defined and the average number of bidders. Apply the discount factor to the preliminary market stumpage price to calculate the preliminary upset stumpage rate.
2. Calculate the estimated number of bidders using the equation in Section 7.4.3 with the variables for the timber sale.
3. Calculate the market stumpage price using the equation in Section 7.4.4, the variables for the timber sale and the estimated number of bidders calculated in Section 7.4.2.
4. Calculate the upset stumpage price by discounting the market stumpage price calculated in Section 7.4.4 using the discount factor in Section 7.4.5.

One stumpage rate is determined for all appraised coniferous sawlogs in each cutting authority area. Other products and deciduous species are priced using miscellaneous stumpage rates as specified under Section 6.6.

7.3 Log Selling Prices

Invoiced (f.o.b.) log market values are compiled from prime, domestic, arms-length sales the Alberni Inlet east of a line drawn south from Amphitrite Point; Johnstone Strait; the Queen Charlotte Strait south of a line drawn west from Cape Caution; and the Fraser River west of the bridge at the confluence of the Pitt River.

For the Market Pricing System a set of average log market values by species and log grade is developed using sales data for each one-month reporting period. The one-month sales data is used to produce a schedule of average market values by species and log grade published monthly by Revenue Branch for stumpage rate calculations.

7.3.1 Log Grade Percentage

7.3.2 Calculation of Stand Selling Price

If VOL is greater than 35 000, then VOL = 35 000.

If the calculated number of bidders is less than 2, then number of bidders = 2.

Where:

Margin = average log price current month - preliminary upset stumpage rate

Δ ALP = ALP current month minus ALP previous month (\$/m³)

FD = 1.0440 (South Island Forest District)

The following variables take a value of 1 if the cutting authority area requires these specified operations, otherwise they are set to zero.

BARGEDUM BARGEDUM = 1, where part of the route from local tie-up grounds at the appraised point of origin to point of appraisal is exposed to the open ocean swell. Otherwise BARGEDUM = 0.

Only points on the West Coast of Vancouver Island north of Port Renfrew, (except those routes totally east of a line drawn from Cape Beale to Amphitrite Point, including Ucluelet Harbour), and all points north of Cape Caution on the mainland are considered to require barge transportation.

CTDUM CTDUM = 1, where the volume harvested from the cutting authority area is by commercial thinning. Otherwise CTDUM = 0.

Commercial thinning is a silviculture treatment that "thins" out overstocked immature stands by removing trees that are large enough to be manufactured into lumber, post or pole products. It is carried out to improve the health and growth rate of the remaining crop trees. The cut is from "below" for the entire even-aged stand.

7.4.5 Upset Stumpage Rate (Step 4)

For each cutting authority area, the MPS upset stumpage rate is determined by selecting the greater of:

- the MPS upset stumpage rate, or
- the prescribed minimum stumpage rate.

Upset Stumpage Rate (\$/m³) = Market Stumpage Rate (From Step 3) * (1 - Discount Factor)

Where:

Discount Factor = 0.30

7.4.6 Prescribed Minimum Stumpage Rate

The minimum stumpage rate is prescribed by the Minimum Stumpage Rate Regulation (B.C. Reg. 354/87). The current minimum stumpage rate is \$0.25 per cubic metre.

7.4.7 Total MPS Stumpage Rate

The total stumpage rate is the upset stumpage rate plus any bonus bid.

7.5 Deciduous and Miscellaneous Forest Products

The stumpage rate for deciduous sawlogs, all species grade “Y” and other miscellaneous forest products are found in Section 6.6.

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
