Fire camp	Okanagan Complex Fire Camp
Incident overview	The last size estimation was 577 hectares; however, the fire grew yesterday and an updated map and size will be posted once it becomes available. There are 55 personnel on site. 6 helicopters are assigned to the complex. This fire is classified as out of control.
Weather forecast	Today we will see mainly sunny skies with lingering smoke. There is a 30% chance of lightning and 20% chance of dry lightning. Northwesterly winds gusting at 20 are predicted to reach 40 km/h by this afternoon.
Fire behaviour prediction	Fires located on the east side may see slightly stronger winds today due to exposure. Expect fire spread to be slope driven (unless terrain is less than 30% slope). If fire spread is a result of wind, it will generally be in a southerly direction.
Challenges	The fingers of this wildfire are still presenting challenges as they make suppression a time consuming task as these fingers lengthen the perimeter. Fingers are the long narrow extensions of a fire projecting from the main body. The steep and rocky terrain of this wildfire also presents some challenges as it brings tough working conditions for ground crews. The fire grew west towards the lake yesterday; however, no homes are threatened at this time. This growth was a result of slope and wind.
Yesterday's achievements	Crews mopped-up (extinguished hot spots) and patrolled from Okanagan Lake to the north flank and have turned the corner and are heading west in order to continue suppression efforts.
Today's objectives	Today, crews will be establishing a hose lay and control line from the lakeside along the south flank. A heat scan will be scheduled in order to detect further hot spots. Skimmers are not being utilized this morning due to visibility issues. We are using helicopters to support ground crews with suppression efforts.
<p>Out of Control: Describes a wildfire that is not responding (or only responding on a limited basis) to suppression action, such that the perimeter spread is not being contained.</p> <p>Being Held: indicated that (with the resources currently committed to the fire) sufficient suppression action has been taken that the fire is not likely to spread beyond existing or predetermined boundaries under the prevailing and forecasted conditions.</p> <p>Under Control: The fire has received sufficient suppression action to ensure no further spread of the fire.</p>	

Out: The fire has been extinguished.
