| Incident overview | Estimated at 1790 hectares in size. 62 personnel and 2 pieces of heavy equipment are on site today. Air support, as required. 6 helicopters are assigned to the complex. Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure contractors will be danger tree assessing and falling along the Hwy 97 corridor between Peachland and Summerland. This wildfire is classified as under control. |
| Weather forecast | A strong upper ridge will continue to provide hot and sunny conditions. With the air mass becoming slightly unstable, there is a slight risk (20%) of an afternoon thunderstorm. Southerly winds will gust up to 40 km/h near Kelowna and 10-20 km/h elsewhere. Temperatures are predicted to range between 32- 37 degrees today. |
| Fire behaviour prediction | We will see winds remain light over the next few days and temperatures will decrease. However, with instability in the forecast, be prepared for some gusty conditions at times. |
| Challenges | The high temperatures and lack of shade continues to challenge ground crews. As a result, the importance of hydration is being emphasized. Slopes are steep and consisting of shale and rock, which makes patrolling a time consuming task. |
| Yesterday's achievements | Crews continue to patrol the area looking for new hot spots to extinguish. |
| Today's objectives | Firefighters will patrol the west and south flanks in order to suppress any heat that they find. |
| Other | The Okanagan Complex is transitioning to a new incident management team. New contact information for the new fire information officers will be posted on the BC Wildfire Service wildfires of note webpage once the changeover occurs. Please be advised that even though fires within the complex seem inactive, resources are being downsized and some fire equipment is getting demobilized, these fires will still produce smoke. The perimeters of these wildfires are being mopped-up (extinguished) and any smoke that does appear will be from fuels burning well within the middle. This smoke is anticipated. |
