Incident overview	<p>This fire was discovered on August 15, since then ground crews, helicopters, air tankers and heavy equipment have been assigned to this fire.</p> <p>The current size of the fire is estimated at 1,380ha. Area change is a result of growth on the north flank late last week and updated mapping. This wildfire is classified as Being Held.</p> <p>Community members can still expect to see smoke within the perimeter over the coming weeks. This is common with large wildfires and will continue until the region receives significant rainfall or snowfall. If smoke is seen coming from well within a fire's perimeter and the area is surrounded by black, burned material, this is typically not a concern.</p>
Weather forecast	<p>TODAY: Mainly cloudy with scattered showers and a slight risk of thunderstorms. High temperature 10 C and low RH near 50%. Winds becoming W 10-20 km/h during the morning and strengthening to W-NW 15-25 G35 km/h by late afternoon. Overnight low near 0 C and RH recovery to near 90%. Winds W 15-25 G 35 km/h.</p> <p>Outlook:The trough remains stagnant over the region through Saturday, with an unstable airmass and isolated to scattered showers. Temperatures will be cooling into the lower single digits each day and light winds will prevail – southwest on Thursday becoming more northwest on Friday and Saturday.</p>
Synopsis	The upper low that has been the predominant weather feature recently is dropping to a position off Vancouver Island by this afternoon and the region will be in a cool and unstable airmass. This will allow isolated showers or thunderstorms to form this afternoon. The low will dissipate by tomorrow afternoon and the upper trough will be over the fire area with more instability, showers and isolated thunderstorms, along with cooler temperatures.
Challenges	Steep slopes, danger trees and rolling debris along the scree slopes.
Yesterday's achievements	Crews continue to demob gear where necessary.
Today's objectives	Overnight, the fire received 3mm of rain and this morning the temperature on the fire was 0 degrees. Crews continue with suppression action as required. Demob equipment where necessary.

Definitions: Stages of Control

- Out of Control:** Describes a wildfire that is not responding (or only responding on a limited basis) to suppression action, such that the perimeter spread is not being contained.
- Being Held:** Indicates that (with the resources currently committed to the fire) that sufficient suppression action has been taken that the fire is not likely to spread beyond existing or predetermined boundaries under the prevailing and forecasted conditions.
- Under Control:** Indicates that the fire has received sufficient suppression action to ensure no further spread of the fire.
- Out:** Indicates that the fire has been extinguished.
